Spend a **semester** taking part in a frontline community development project in Indonesia and receive **academic credit** towards your degree.

About the Program

A semester-long program based in Yogyakarta, Central Java, designed for students of development studies. This program allows participants to gain valuable 'hands on' experience in the field of international development.

Students will have the opportunity to engage with community development issues in Indonesia through either an eight-week community development field work module known as Student Community Service (SCS), or an eight-week Development Placement with a local community-based organisation as a part of their semester in Yogyakarta.

What is involved?

- » Intensive Indonesian language classes, aimed at intermediate functionality;
- » English language lectures by international experts in the field of development studies;
- » A two-month supervised and assessed 'frontline' community development project; either through Student Community Service or Development Placement; and
- » A final academic, assessed report in English by the student.



Applications are due by 1 September for Semester 1 and 15 March for Semester 2.
