The Business Professional Practicum (BPP) is designed to provide students of business, management and marketing with the opportunity to put business theory and analysis into practice in Jakarta's growing economy.

Indonesia is predicted to be the world's fifth largest economy by 2030.

Students will gain a foothold in the Indonesian business world, developing their professional skills in a real-life work environment.

This program will be overseen by a experienced business professional with extensive knowledge of the Indonesian business world.

The program runs from early January until mid-February each year.

What is involved?

- ◆ 2 weeks of intensive Indonesian language classes;
- ◆ 2 weeks of workshops and presentations by local experts in the field of business and commerce;
- ◆ A 4-week industry placement at a local or international English language business organisation

What will you get out of it?

- ◆ Experience in Asian business and a chance to establish your networks in Indonesia;
- ◆ A detailed professional evaluation (suitable for your CV/job reference);
- ◆ Academic credit towards your university degree (by negotiation with your university).
