

Gain insight into the vibrant Indonesian arts scene by undertaking a virtual internship

Designed for students who have no existing language skills, this virtual internship program opens up the opportunity for students of fine art, creative arts, new media & arts management to learn about the vibrancy of contemporary Indonesian arts and cultural production, combining academic elements with work experience.

Students will collaborate with Indonesian peers and creative practitioners to produce work including, but not limited to: short films, animations, sound and video art, websites, online installations, blogs and social media apps.

This program is overseen by an experienced academic with extensive knowledge of the Indonesian creative arts and design sector.

The virtual program runs twice a year. Once over a six-week (intensive) period from early January until mid-February (summer) and once over a twelve-week (intensive/flexible) period from late June until late September (winter).

What is involved?

- ◆ Indonesian language classes;

- ◆ Supervised professional placement with an Indonesian or international organisation (or with an individual practitioner, artist collective, or art/design studio).

- ◆ Experience in creative arts and design in a professional context and a chance to establish networks in Indonesia;
- ◆ A detailed professional evaluation suitable for your CV or as a job reference; and
- ◆ Academic credit towards your university degree (by negotiation with your university).
